## LYMAN ALLYN ART MUSEUM ANNOUNCES RELOCATION OF ICONIC SCULPTURE <u>"STAR AND SEA"</u>

**NEW LONDON** - The Lyman Allyn Art Museum announces the relocation of *Star and Sea*, a prominent sculpture by artist Allyson Holtz, to the roundabout near General Dynamics on Pequot Avenue in New London. The move coincides with ongoing construction for the new Lyman Allyn Park.

Weighing eight tons and made of Corten steel, *Star and Sea* has stood on the Museum's front lawn since 2008, welcoming visitors with its bold, maritime-inspired presence. Originally commissioned in 1981 by the Thames Valley Steel Company and the Carr family as a gift to the City of New London, the sculpture was fabricated at Thames Valley Steel in New London using HY-80 steel (commonly used in submarine construction) and was first installed downtown, northeast of the Water Street Garage.

Artist Allyson Holtz described the piece upon its original installation: "*Star and Sea* is a site-specific work that I created to reflect the history and

character of New London. The location of the sculpture – overlooking the Thames River and beyond it, Long Island Sound – points to the significance of water, the sea, submarines, sailing ships – generally, the things I love most about the City and southeastern Connecticut shore."

The Museum is proud to see this beloved work find a new home, closer to the sea, where it will continue to celebrate New London's rich cultural and nautical heritage.

Holtz, a Connecticut native, is a founding member of Hygienic Art and served as its President from 1979 to 1990. She is a graduate of Electric Boat's Trades Academies (formerly Ambit Welding School) and spent two years as structural welder at EB where she worked on the USS Georgia. This compelling experience led her to earning a master's degree (concentration in the History of American Submarine Technology) at Wesleyan University.
